
CHINMAYA PRADĪPIKĀ CMSD QUARTERLY NEWSLETTER

Homage to Śrī Tyāgarāja



On January 22, 2022, CMSD celebrated Eighth $Ty\bar{a}gar\bar{a}ja$ $\bar{A}r\bar{a}dhan\bar{a}$ – the *Mahāsamādhi* of the great *bhaktā* $Sr\bar{i}$ $Ty\bar{a}gar\bar{a}ja$, on the same day when it is celebrated in Tiruvaiyyuru located in the state of Tamil Nadu. $Sr\bar{i}$ $Ty\bar{a}gar\bar{a}ja$'s musical compositions are a vast pillar of Indian Carnatic music and enjoyed by millions around the world. Born in the 18th century Tamil Nadu, $Sr\bar{i}$ $Ty\bar{a}gar\bar{a}ja$ composed music (called *kṛtis*) as "*upāsanā*" – love for the Lord. Hence his works are called *Nadopāsanā*. $Ty\bar{a}gar\bar{a}ja$ is among the seers who showed that the art forms such as music and dance are not just entertainment (for pleasure or "*bhoga*") but also for enlightenment (to unite with the Higher or "*yoga*"). His *kṛtis* are on different deities though he was especially fond of Lord *Rāma*. His works are filled with the highest teachings of *Vedānta* and so some of his followers call his works as $Ty\bar{a}ga$ *Brahmopaniṣat*.





Tyāgarāja $\bar{A}r\bar{a}dhan\bar{a}$ at CMSD began with a reverential $p\bar{u}j\bar{a}$ by **Lakshmi Aunty**. On behalf of Chinmaya *Kalā Jyoti* team, **Nagesh Nookala** presented a succinct background of $Sr\bar{i}$ *Tyāgarāja* and **Amarnath Puttur** introduced the musicians. It is customary to render the *pañcaratna kṛtis* on $\bar{A}r\bar{a}dhan\bar{a}$ day. These are the five gems of his compositions. The first three *kṛtis* praise the Lord and the last two praise the *bhaktās*. Listening to them is *upāsanā* (devotion) in itself.



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

We were fortunate to have an opportunity to cherish heart-warming performances by three very talented local musicians - **Devesh Vashishtha** (vocal), **Shankar Guhados** (vocal) and **Radhakrishnan Ramachandran** (flute). They took the audience to great heights with their melodious renderings of the *pañcaratna kṛtis* in beautiful synchrony and interludes of voice and flute. They also offered other *Tyāgarāja kṛtis* individually.





Sowmian Rangarajan offered the beautiful banturīti kolu krti in rāga hamsanādam. There were soulful individual offerings by several young artists. Young talented artist Nivedva Krishnan, Grade 5 BV student, offered girirāja sutā in rāga bangāla seeking protection of Lord Ganeśa. Chinmaya Dhvani children offered vara līla gāna lola in rāga śankarābharanam in praise of Bhagavān Visnu. Adarsh Radhakrishnan played sujana jīvana in rāga khamās on the flute and sang yocana kamala locana in rāga darbār dedicated to Lord Rāma.

The program concluded the traditional way, wishing the well-being of all at the feet of Lord *Rāma* with *Śrī Tyāgarāja*'s *mangalam kṛti* in *rāga sourāshtram*.

Today I was transported after hearing the beautiful *krtis* of *Tyāgarāja*. Music is said to be the universal language and in today's festival I experienced that firsthand."

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Satyam Śivam Sundaram - Mahāśivarātrī Celebrations



On February 27, 2022, creating a spirit of $Sivar\bar{a}tr\bar{i}$ during the BV session, Grade 2 children enacted two plays, one with the story of *Brahmā* and *Viṣṇu* trying to find the end of the mysterious light beam, and another story of the hunter and tiger. They energetically conveyed the stories with fun and vibrant costumes. Grade 9 children showcased symbolism behind the different aspects of Lord *Śiva*, including river *Gaṅgā* flowing from his matted locks to the crescent moon adorned on his head and his blue neck that holds poison.

Chinmaya families gathered with devotion and reverence to the participate in auspicious Mahāśivarātrī celebrations on March 1, 2022. The blowing of the conch shell heralded the proceedings and Chinmaya Dhvani invoked Lord Ganeśa with the song "Namastestu Ganapate". Led by Lakshmi Aunty, the gathering chanted the sankalpa in unison to partake in the rituals.

Having ceremoniously welcomed the sweet and Śiva, simple Lord the beautiful and mesmerizing ritual of abhisekam was performed. Lakshmi Aunty made sure to teach the little children about the significance and offerings during the ritual before it commenced. The Śiva Linga was lovingly bathed with pañcāmṛtam, milk, curd, honey, Ganges water, lemon juice, coconut water, sugar and rice flour.

The picture of the blissful *Bholenāth* that adorned the *pūjā pandāl*, with his eyes closed, reminded us that the joy is all in the inner world, the *"antaḥkaraṇa"*. The sound of the *abhiṣekam* water trickling down the *Linga* interspersed with the sacred vedic chants of the *Śrī Rudram camakam* in the background. The *yajñaśālā* resounded with the chanting of *Śiva Aṣtottaranāmāvali*, *Lingāṣtakam*, *Śiva pañcākṣara stotram*, *Śiva mānasa pūjā*, *Kāla-bhairavāṣtakam* and heartfelt renditions of *bhajans*.

As the evening was transformed into night, the group with single minded remembrance chanted "OM namaḥ Śivāya" imprinting the image of the Lord, just as our Gurudev had done in his childhood, into the minds. Children too took turns to lead the group and in all directions the senses were drowned in this charged energy created by the *sanga* with the Lord.

Just as **Lakshmi Aunty** ceremoniously planted two *Rudrākṣa* seeds in the Ashram on this auspicious night, we as a family plant our minds firmly on *Śiva* and welcome the new dawn.


