Chinmaya Jayanti Celebrations

May 8, 2021 marked the **105th Jayanti of Pujya Gurudev**. This special occasion also provided the first opportunity, after a year of lockdown due to Covid-19, for a gradual return to our $\bar{a}srama$ for celebrations. A small set of families, whose children had participated in the Chinmaya Gitanjali earlier, were invited to be present in person and seated in the courtyard, while strictly following COVID guidelines.



After an invocation by Chinmaya Swaranjali, who offered "Ao Gurudeva" Lakshmi Aunty performed the Guru pādukā pūjā with CMSD members, those present in person and others participating via zoom, joining along in the chanting of the *aṣtottaraśatanāmāvalī* (108 names) of Pujya Gurudev. The chanting of the meditative Tapovana ṣaṭkam and Guru pādukā stotram marked an offering of gratitude and deep reverence to the Guru paramparā.



Chinmaya Dhvani offered the uplifting song "Chinmayam Vande Jagadgurum." This was followed by the chanting of chapter two from $Sr\bar{r}madbhagavadg\bar{t}\bar{t}$ led by the students, who had previously offered Gitanjali sevā.

CMSD 21st Annual Program Presentations

Language Classes Presentations on June 6, 2021



CMSD's 2021 Annual Program very aptly brings in the focus on "The Art of Communication - Power of Speech". The students of Tamil Pallikoodam initiated the program with a melodious recitation of the song "Thamizhththai Vaazhthu", which is a tribute to the Goddess of Tamil Language followed by a serene rendition of "Vellaitamarai Kadavul Vaazhthu", a tribute to Vagdevi (Goddess of Speech - Saraswati) written by the Saint Bharathiyar. Grades 3 & 4 sang playful "Kuzhandhai Padalkal" or children's rhymes.

Taking examples from the prominent literary work Thirukkural, Grades 3, 4, 6 & 7 presented three Kuralgal (short couplets) in reference to effective communication and explained their meanings in both Tamil and English. The students concluded that the knowledge acquired through the ear is far superior than any other knowledge, whilst speaking provides only useful information in the conversation.

The students of Hindi *Pāthaśālā* beautifully brought to light the different nuances of communication -Vānī (Voice), Karunā (Compassion), Samvama name a few. Grades 1 to 3 (Restraint) to demonstrated their understanding of these concepts by reciting relevant dohā by poet Rahīm Dās, and elaborated on it using stories from Rāmāvanā and Pañcatantra. In the midst of the presentation, the soulful song "Itnī śakti hame denā dhātā" reminded all that only through His Grace can our hearts be cleansed, and it is from a pure heart that springs forth the qualities of sweetness and sensitivity in our speech.




Towards the end of the program, participating children questioned the audience - "Kab aur Kase bole?" Kab aur Kase sune?" "Kab cupa rahe?" (When & How to speak? When and How to Listen? When to remain silent?). In conclusion they stated - "Vākpaţutvam ek kalā hai jiske liye abhyās jarūri hai." (Eloquence in speech is an art that is forged only through continuous practice).

The focus of the presentations by Samskrta Vihar Grades 1 through 5 students was "Samuccāraņam - correct pronunciation of the words used in speech. Mispronunciation of the words conveys an entirely different meaning, the students portrayed this with a series of skits. The conversation between a shopper & her friend ends up in a hilarious situation when the shopper uses the word "grahapraveśa" (Planet entry in place of "grhapraveśa" (Housewarming), while sharing the happy news.

The students next piqued the interest of the audience by engaging in some clever riddles. These riddles brought to light the degree of refinement and inherent beauty in the language of Samskrta. Aptly summarized by Pallavi Kulkarni, Samskrta is a refined language and platform to carry forth the rich Indian culture and the ornament of mastered speech is an embellishment that never fades.

BVGraduates' Reflections




